ISRAEL'S RESTORATION

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Intercede in this Time of War

Every family in Israel has been touched by the current war. Fathers, sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, friends have been called up to fight. The families of Tikkun-related congregations are no exception.

From the beginning of the war, I have been led to conduct daily intercessory prayer times in Hebrew. Here are some of our key points for prayer:

Strength and renewal for our government leaders as well as high level army and security officials who face constant criticism, blame and anger. Pray against division in the government and for the right coalition to form, of leaders who can work together in an atmosphere of mutual respect.

Guidance for correct strategy as we come to the end of the first phase of the war including the ability to disarm the last remaining terrorist cells still operating in Gaza.

Protection for the soldiers who are involved in present combat. It's become guerrilla warfare which is very hard to quell or curtail. Buildings are booby trapped and individual snipers pop out of tunnels or humanitarian zones.

Wisdom for our leaders in hostage release negotiations; where to draw the line for concessions. Yahya Sinwar, master of the October 7 attack, was freed from prison in Israel in a prisoner/hostage exchange years ago, and nobody wants this repeated.

Supernatural strength and stamina for the hostages. It is unfathomable how they are staying alive and what their mental and physical condition is. Some hostages who were previously freed said they maintained sanity by quoting psalms. Pray that they would find and cling to hope in God!

Continued healing and recovery for the hundreds of soldiers and civilians injured in the October 7 attack and since. There is a lack of adequate medical staff including doctors and rehabilitation professionals. Israel has been accepting medical volunteers from



abroad who fulfill the requirements, something that was never done in the past.

Supernatural comfort and hope for the families of those killed in this conflict. That their pain would draw them near to God and revelation of Yeshua.

Arab Israelis, including Arab Israeli believers who are caught between their support for the country, and identification with Palestinians and Gazans. The Arabic speaking Bedouins from the south and Druze from the north, many of whom serve faithfully in the army, have paid an enormous price in this war, particularly with fallen soldiers. Some of the hostages are also from this community.

The rebuilding of Gaza, including infrastructure, medical facilities, and education without hate-indoctrination. And most important, the right body to carry this out – probably a combination of non-Hamas linked Palestinians and internationals, with Israel maintaining control over security measures.

The volatile situation in the West Bank where the same undercurrent of hatred for Israel exists. Pray for leaders among the Palestinian citizens who will be willing to work with Israel for the good of their people and root out this cycle of hatred and violence.

The northern front where a controlled war is already taking place with Hezbollah. As the more intense phase of the war in Gaza comes to an end, all eyes will be on the north.

Displaced citizens from northern and southern communities unable to return to their homes, work and schools.

For the Messianic community in Israel to be strengthened. There are many soldiers from our communities and outreaches to the displaced and needy. May the Lord lead us to embrace the needs of those both inside and outside of our communities and bear fruit for His kingdom.

"The fervent prayer of a righteous man is powerful and effective." (James 5:16)



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We are all living in challenging times, and yet God is with us throughout the journey. It is important to be aware of the circumstances around us, but to "manage our reality," by trusting in God. We don't have direct control over what's happening in our nations and beyond, but we do have control over how we react, *what we focus on*, and how we guard our heart.

Our faith is tested when life is difficult, not when it's easy. Yet when the Lord is part of the picture, we can move from a state of survival to growth, from hopelessness to hope.

We must ask, "What am I focusing on?" and be open to changing our perspective. Am I seeing the challenge through God's eyes? If I am only aware of what is in front of me, I miss God. That's why it's important to "zoom out," and see things from His point of view. The moment I choose to look to the God above me, , more than the problem in front of me, I build my faith.

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1 NKJV)

We place at His feet the things that currently do not make sense, and the trials we don't want to pass through, knowing that He is in control.

"And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose." (Romans 8:28)

Elijah and David - Flesh and Blood Like Us

Let's learn how God helped two of our forefathers in the faith emerge victorious from great difficulties. After Elijah killed the prophets of the false god, Queen Jezebel threatened to kill him. In spite of the sweeping victory on Mt. Carmel, Elijah became filled with terror and fled south.

"... he went into a cave, and spent the night in that place; and behold, the word of the Lord came to him, and He said to him, What are you doing here, Elijah? So he said, I have been very zealous for the Lord God of hosts; for the children of Israel have forsaken Your covenant, torn down Your altars, and killed Your prophets with the sword. I alone am left; and they seek to take my life." (1 Kings 19:9-10)

- In spite of his recent success, Elijah allowed fear and emotions to dictate his path.
- He forgot God, forgot his call to serve, and ran away.
- Elijah felt abandoned and alone. Sometimes you and I may feel the same, longing to leave everything behind. Elijah hid himself in a cave. In our case, the cave might be an addiction, depression, or enforced isolation. In any case, God will ask, "What are you doing here?"
- With this question, God compelled Elijah to "zoom out," return to his calling and fellowship.

Have you too felt alone with your difficulty – in spite of having family, friends, community? The lie of the enemy says that we are alone. God reminded Elijah that he was not alone. He told Elijah of seven thousand who had not bent the knee to false gods. There were and are other believers!

King David is another example of a man who learned to keep his eyes on the Lord and not on circumstances. It must have been an exciting surprise for David as a youth, when Samuel came to anoint him king of Israel. However the path to his coronation involved many trials and took many years.

We are planning on holding three camps for our children, some independently and others in partnership with friends.



Since 2015, Return to Zion has been running the **Eagle Project** for Messianic soldiers who have recently completed their service in the IDF. We usually take them to Norway, but this year we will be in Texas. The group is comprised of 30 soldiers, many of whom are dealing with trauma caused by their time in the military. Our aim is to provide them with rest, as well as physical, mental, and spiritual restoration. Your prayers are greatly needed!

In these times, the world seems filled with lies. Wars, disasters, or epidemics have existed throughout history. What most concerns me at present is the unprecedented proliferation of lies. They are everywhere – in politics, the news, medicine, statistics, and even the climate. Everything is saturated with manipulation and deception, and we must seek the Lord's discernment to evaluate everything in its true light. The Bible calls Satan the "Father of Lies." Revelation 20:7 states that Satan will deceive the nations. 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From the North

Since the October 7th attack on our Southern border, much prayer has been focused towards Gaza. At the same time, Hezbollah has launched thousands of rockets against the Galilee. Therefore, we have also been praying for Northern Israel.

Yet beyond these current attacks from Lebanon, we anticipate the situation escalating and becoming much more intense. Over twenty Israeli villages and towns bordering Lebanon have been evacuated since the beginning of the war. These 100,000 Israelis are internally displaced refugees, waiting and hoping that the IDF can make it safe for them to return to their homes before the school year begins. This may require an IDF ground invasion, in response to which Hezbollah would send tens of thousands of rockets to rain down on Israeli cities in the north and throughout Israel.

In early summer, I met together with Israeli pastors from congregations in the North. We attempted to estimate the possible damage to civilian areas where our congregants live. Even though we have supplied each family with an emergency medical kit and instructions for what food and supplies they should have on hand, it still doesn't seem enough.

In addition to physical preparation, we must invest in emotional and spiritual preparations. Drawing close to the Lord is our greatest defense. We pray that when the hour of our testing comes, each one of us, both here and around the world, will put our trust in God. May the following words of Isaiah regarding Yeshua our Messiah-Teacher guide, strengthen and encourage us:

Although the Lord has given you bread of deprivation and water of oppression, He, your Teacher, will no longer hide Himself, but your eyes will see your Teacher. Your ears will hear a word behind you, saying, "This is the way, walk in it." (Isaiah 30:20-21)

Again, thank you for your prayers and intercession; they are needed now more than ever.



Who Do You Trust?

Even though these are painful and frustrating times, this not a new scenario for Israel. The Bible tells of challenges and wars throughout our history. Reading Isaiah 31, I can see many parallels from the time of the prophets, the same threats and the same tendency to seek help from other nations (for example Egypt).

The prophets urged Israel to lean on God and not on allies. When the Lord fights for you, all the world's powers are inferior. When I look at Israel today, I see disagreement over critical decisions. Media and public opinion sway to and fro, while our soldiers are giving their lives. In the midst of it all, there is one thing Israel is forgetting – the God who chose Israel. He is the One who brought us back to the land, and He is the One who will save us.

When I look toward Jerusalem, I pray that my government will have wisdom, unity and guidance from the Lord. When the enemies of Israel rise up to kill, steal and destroy; we must remember that the arm of flesh will fail. We must put our trust in the One who cannot fail, the One who can fight for us with His outstretched arm!

"Give us help from trouble, For the help of man is useless. Through God we will do valiantly, For it is He who shall tread down our enemies." (Psalm 60:11-12 NKJV)

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- Time is a tool in God's hands; God is in no hurry, and so this is not wasted time. In David's life, God used those years to further shape and build his character.
- David's confidence came to be in God and not in circumstances.
- David had to change his focus from what was in front of his eyes, to what God had promised; reminding himself that God fulfills His promises. Throughout rejection, loss and tragedy, David poured all that he learned and experienced into the psalms that have inspired generations and still encourage us today.

Where do you find yourself in this story? Can you proclaim with me now, what David proclaimed in a challenging time?

"I would surely have despaired unless I had believed that I would see the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living... Hope in the Lord! Be strong! Let your heart take courage! Hope in the Lord!" (Psalm 27:13-14)

Let's apply this message in our lives.

How can we lift our eyes to the Lord in the present reality?

1. Spend time in His Word to remember His promises. David was almost killed multiple times, but he knew that his life was in God's hands (Luke 12:7).

2. Spend time in prayer before God. Surrender to Him all that burdens your heart (Philippians 4:6).

3. Be locally connected to other believers in a faith community. Realizing that he was not alone helped Elijah through his crisis.

4. Encourage others by sharing what God has done in your life. Remind yourself. He was faithful in the past and will continue to be.

By the Lord's grace I encourage us to focus on Him. Continue running the race. Even if we stumble and fail, let's not run and hide in a cave, but help each other onward towards all that He has promised.

"For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, is working for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory, while we do not look at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen. For the things which are seen are temporary, but the things which are not seen are eternal." (2 Corinthians 4:17-18)



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A Chance at a New Life

When serving homeless drug addicts in South Tel Aviv, we first care for their immediate physical, emotional and spiritual needs, then we offer to help them enter a rehab program. They rarely accept because it is so difficult to leave that life and persevere through rehab.

That's why we were overjoyed when Andrey, whom we have known and served for a long time, said he wanted to go to rehab. He also asked for 350 shekels. Drug addicts often ask for money, but we never carry any with us or give it out to them because it invariably goes to buy drugs or alcohol. Yet Andrey seemed sincere in his request. We were doubtful because Andrey has started multiple rehab programs before, but he insisted that this time would be different; this time he had the motivation and determination to overcome his addiction. I suggested that he come back to the soup kitchen facility with us where we could arrange a place for him.

Andrey, however, had a particular program in mind and their admission fee was 350 shekels in cash. This made us even more skeptical. "It's great that you are giving out food and drink on the streets," he said, "But what I need right now is money to get into this specific program." Shulamit, one of our most faithful volunteers, gave him her phone number, and Andrey allowed me to pray for him. Afterwards I told him, "You have Shulamit's number. If the rehab facility will contact her, we will be happy to wire them the money directly.

A few days later we were happily surprised to receive a phone call from a counselor at the facility Andrey had told us about. He was there with her, ready to sign up. All he needed was the admission fee!

Overcoming a Broken and Painful Past

Behind every person we minister to, there is a painful story of loss, trauma and abuse. To manage their emotional and physical pain, they start using drugs as an escape, quickly destroying their lives.

Andrey too has such a story. He was married at a young age and soon the young couple were overwhelmed but excited to learn that they were expecting twins. Not long before she was supposed to give birth, his wife and the twins were tragically killed in a car accident! In confusion and despair, Andrey returned to their apartment without his key. He tried climbing in through a window but fell several floors to the ground and was seriously injured. Andrey went through multiple surgeries and came out with titanium plates and severe pain. He became addicted to the powerful prescription pain killers and eventually progressed to hard-core drugs.

A New Life

Almost all drug addicts living on the street suffer from malnutrition, infections, illnesses and lack of sleep. At age thirty an addict may look sixty years old. Andrey was like that when he began the program. Shulamit has faithfully visited him each week and took some pictures during a recent visit. When she showed me the photos, I was shocked at how healthy and happy he looked. What an honor and privilege to be a part of stories like Andrey's. Keep him in your prayers and thank you for supporting this outreach!



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Navigating the Wilderness

"How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?" (Psalm 13:1)

I truly enjoy spending time in the Israeli deserts, but I do not enjoy traveling through a wilderness of the spirit. Yet whether we like them or not, every believer will experience the wilderness, often as prolonged periods of spiritual dryness. Why does God allow this and how can we grow as a result?

While in a desert period, we often feel disconnected from God. Even when we take time to read and pray, we might not sense His presence or hear His voice. The peace and connection we once felt seem to vanish. In these times, the hidden chambers of our hearts are opened. God brings us to our personal "mountain of God" where we come to know Him and ourselves more deeply. In the wilderness, God questions our motives, which arise from the depths of our hearts.

Disappointment can set in because God seems absent and doesn't provide in the usual way. Where is He? We feel abandoned, losing the joy found in Scripture and prayer. We feel thirsty and alone, crying out for His presence. These seasons bring everything we've suppressed to the surface – emptiness, inferiority, self-rejection, anger, and confusion. These feelings lead to bitterness. Though Satan exploits this, it's also part of God's plan so we can confront our hidden sins and our true selves without masks or illusions. This process reveals our need for God's intervention and transformation. Like Yeshua, who was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by Satan, we learn to distinguish between God's voice and the enemy's lies. The wilderness is a place of learning and discipleship. God reveals the enemy's strategy and teaches us to recognize and resist his accusations. This period of spiritual dryness forces us to confront our true nature and seek God with a pure heart. The transformation is profound. We begin to look more like Yeshua, reflecting His character and love. This inner change allows us to bear more fruit and shine His light in the world. Therefore, we should embrace these times as opportunities for deeper intimacy with God. Yeshua's time in the wilderness prepared Him for His ministry. Similarly, our desert experiences prepare us for our calling to reflect His image. "Those whom He foreknew, He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, so that He would be the firstborn among many brothers" (Romans 8:29).

During these times, it's crucial to support one another. When we see a brother or sister going through a wilderness period, we must stand by them, offering love and encouragement without judgment. This solidarity helps us all emerge stronger and more like our Messiah.

Walking through the wilderness allows the light of the Messiah to shine in every corner of our hearts so we can overcome any trial. "They overcame by the blood of the Lamb and by the word of their testimony..." (Revelation 12:11). We fight in faith, knowing that the blood of the Lamb is stronger than anything else that influences our lives. There is no fear or guilt; we stand against the enemy with the assurance of atonement. The declaration of His victory on the cross sustains us.

Even when we feel abandoned, we remind ourselves that God is always with us. In fact, He is leading us through the wilderness, refining us to reflect His glory more clearly. Embrace the sacred journey toward deeper transformation and communion with God.
